We acknowledge the Darug people, the traditional custodians on whose land we educate our students.

Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Friends,

Being lost can be a confusing experience. Sometimes it can even be frightening. On the other hand, being found or finding our way is a great relief. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells us three stories about something or someone being lost and then found - the story of the Lost Sheep (Luke 15:1-7), the story of the Lost Coin (Luke 15:8-10), and the story of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). What do these seekers teach us about God?

They teach that God is searching for us when we are lost. What do these stories teach us about sin and forgiveness? No matter what we do, God will take us back. Sometimes when people are lost, they are able to send up a flare—a bright flaming light—to signal for help. When we are lost because of sin, we can call out to God in prayer for help because he is always searching for us. Just as you would go to any length to find and bring them home if they were lost, so too would God. That is what Jesus is telling us in the three stories. No matter what we do, no matter how wrong we are, God, our loving father, is always anxious to forgive us and welcome us back home.

We have had to postpone our 60th Anniversary Celebrations as the dates for the HSC are earlier than anticipated and so we are unable to secure Nagle Hall. With this in mind, the new date for the Mass and concert is Thursday 10th November. I'm sorry for the inconvenience.

This successful event was patronised by hundreds of dad, granddads and father figures as they ate breakfast with their children, shared stories, played and prayed together. ### Withdrawal of a Student

A full terms notice (10 school weeks) in writing must be given to the Principal before a parent/carer terminates the student's enrolment. ## **Book Fair**





## WELLBEING

## WHY DO CHILDREN NEED BOUNDARIES?

We love our kids, but parenting them is a complex and often confusing task!

To simplify things, it's helpful to understand that we can reduce the job of parenting to one guiding principle: to equip our children to meet the demands of reality. One day your children will need to face reality and handle it without your guidance.

On their own, they will need to:

- make mature choices to follow Christ;
- find great relationships to support their growth;
- set their core values and morals;
- craft their passions and career

One of the most valuable tools you can use to help your kids develop, no matter what age they are, is that of healthy limits, also called boundaries. Research shows that children who experience a household of clear and appropriate boundaries, delivered with love and warmth, are much better equipped to meet the demands of reality over their lifespan.

Three things that children learn when they have boundaries:

- 1. A sense of self
- 2. Self control
- 3. Great relationships



## How do rules help to set boundaries with your children?

- **1. With Love** Talk to your children, with warmth and words, that you love them unconditionally. Kids embrace boundaries in an atmosphere of love rather than in one of emotional detachment or anger. It should be done in a calm and comforting situation.
- **2. Truthfully** Give your children clear ground rules for their behaviour in your home, such as following parents instructions or requests, treating others respectfully and by helping around the house. Put these on a simple list on your fridge so they can easily see them. You might even use a mini reward chart, depending on the age of the child. Teach them they are responsible for things like; cleaning their room, putting their washing away, setting the table for dinner and making their bed each morning.
- **3. Freedom to make a good choice -** Tell your children they can choose whether to follow the ground rules that it's up to them (except in urgent situations where it may become dangerous). If they make good choices and follow the rules or boundaries you have set, praise them or add a stamp to a chart that will help to earn them a treat or type of reward. Great rewards for families are choosing a movie for everyone to watch, choice of dessert, a game of their choice, extended time on a device, a day out somewhere. This does not need to include spending money.
- **4. Keep it real!** Let them know that if they choose not to follow the rules that there are consequences. Following the rules means great times and freedom for your children. Not following the rules can result in a range of consequences, such as time outs, loss of playdates, losing mobile phone privileges, digital devices or stricter curfews. That is, they are free to choose, and through their choices, they are also choosing the outcome. But remember, consequences need to be followed through. So make them realistic.
